Good Morning!

Routines are an important part of our lives; they make sure that we do everything we need to, and they help us know what time of day it is. The Maths work today is about remembering your routines and in what order. Do you know what day it is today? The days of the week will also form part of the Maths work today.

In phonics, you will be practising recognising and matching the alphabet. This can be tricky, so make sure you are looking carefully at the letters. Can you think of what sound each letter makes as you match it?

Remember a lot of the work you are doing is new to you, so just try your best.

We had been singing this song together in Nursery, so your child should be familiar with it. Please make sure they are making the same sounds as the video.


This song will help you with some of the literacy work today!

Literacy (Writing/ Mark Making and Phonics)

Mark making/Fine motor

Get an adult to write out the letters in cake cases or onto post-it notes. Then ask them to write out letters onto beans, buttons, pasta or smaller pieces of paper. Match the alphabet beans (or whatever you have used) and put them into the cake cases.

If you want a challenge, muddle up the letters as well, so it is a bit trickier.



Phonics

Make a DIY I Spy bottle containing S, A and T.

Fill up a bottle with dried beans or rice and small objects beginning with the sounds that you may have around the home and that can fit in. You could even include the letters if you have them.

Maths

Daily Routines




Think of all the things you do in a day as part of your routine. This could include; brushing your teeth, breakfast, bath time, dinner, reading a book, waking up, lunch, getting dressed.

Can you put all the different things you do in a day, in order? What do you do first? What is the last thing you do before falling asleep?

Challenge

Extend out the activities to what you do on each day. For example, on Saturdays I go for a long walk, on Mondays I always go to buy food from the supermarket, I ring my grandparents on Wednesdays.

Can you put these activities in order? What day is at the beginning of the week? What day is next? Do you know what day it is today? What day will it be tomorrow?



Suggested Activities to try throughout the week

Make sparkly snow dough. I have included a recipe below. The 'dough' has a very different texture to playdough and will not hold together in the same way. Can you make penguin footprints in the snow dough? Can you build a snowman?



Sparkly Snow Cloud Dough

Ingredients

- 4 cups of flour (ideally use cornflour for a whiter dough, but plain/all-purpose flour will also work)
- 1 cup of oil (baby oil is suitable and is good because it doesn't have any colour, but vegetable oil would be better for children who may put it in their mouth)
- Glitter

Method

1. Put all the flour and oil in a bowl.
2. Add as much glitter as you like.
3. Stir the mixture together until you create a crumbly-textured dough.
4. If necessary add more oil to bring the ingredients together.
5. Let the fun commence. You can squeeze it together and it will hold its shape and then use your fingertips to make it crumbly again.

What kind of penguins did you learn about? Where do they live? How is where they live different from where you live?



When you are on a walk, collect some of the natural things you find. Like leaves, flowers, stones etc. When you get back home, use these found things plus what you might have at home, like shells or pinecones to make the faces of the people you live with. Can you make everyone's faces?



You can also use your found things to make prints in salt dough. Here is a great salt dough recipe: www.bbcgoodfood.com/howto/guide/how-make-salt-dough-recipe

You can then cook the salt dough, or you can let it dry, though this may take a few days. Once it has dried, you can paint the salt dough and decorate it.



Get ready for Reception! Can you dress a teddy bear with your school uniform? Can you do the buttons by yourself? If you do not have a teddy bear, you could dress yourself. Which part did you find the trickiest?
