Writing

This week we will be writing instruction leaflets on how to carry out certain exercises. Maybe we could give these instructions to our family members to inspire them to keep fit and healthy. Here is an example of some instructions about how to cook healthy food. They tell the reader *why* to cook healthy food and *how* to cook healthy food. Our instructions for exercises will follow the same pattern.

Wonderful ways to cook wholesome, healthy food

We know how important it is to eat healthy foods. They are good for our hearts, brains and muscles. They give us energy, help us to sleep and make us grow stronger. Some people think that healthy food is boring and tasteless. This is not true! Healthy food can be full of flavour and bring delight to your taste buds!

Some people think it is really hard to cook healthy food. This is not true! Healthy food can be simple, easy to make and lots of fun!

This leaflet will show you how to make delicious, easy, healthy meals.

Pasta bake with vegetables

What you need: saucepan, frying pan, oven tray, wholemeal pasta, broccoli, onion, cheddar cheese.

What you do:

1. Cook the pasta in the saucepan. Add the broccoli for the last 2 minutes
2. Fry the onion for 5 minutes in the frying pan. Make sure you do not burn it.
3. Mix the cooked pasta, onion and broccoli together well.
4. Grate the cheese over the mixture thoroughly.
5. Place into an oven for 10 minutes or until the cheese is melted and bubbling.

LO: To plan a set of instructions

Today, we will be deciding on which exercises we wish to include in our instructions.

People celebrate the NHS because they want to say thank you to all the NHS staff for their hard work.


How Do People Celebrate the NHS?

Raising money to help the NHS has been another way to celebrate. Sir Captain Tom Moore is now famous because he walked around his garden 100 times. He wanted to complete the challenge before his 100th birthday. He raised millions of pounds for the NHS.


